Foreword

He edits *Economics of Governance* and has been the editor of *Economic Policy*. In the year 2000 he received the Gossen award, that is awarded annually to German economists below the age of 45 that have won international recognition. He has published a large number of research articles, in journals as *American Economic Review*, *Economic Journal, Journal of Public Economics* and *European Economic Review*.
